Pride Month

The significance of Pride Month

- Pride month is celebrated in June to honour the Stonewall Uprising in June 1969 which was a pivotal moment in the historical fight for queer rights in North America.
- It commemorates years of struggle for civil rights, and the ongoing pursuit of equal justice under the law, as well as celebrates the accomplishments of 2SLGBTQIA+ people.

2SLGBTQIA+ EXPLAINED

TWO-SPIRIT

A contemporary term that refers to the historical and current First Nations people whose individual spirits were or are a blend of male and female spirits. This term has been reclaimed by some in Indigenous Native American LGBT communities in order to honor their heritage and provide an alternative to the Western labels of gay, lesbian, bisexual, or transgender.

L

LESBIAN

A self-identified woman who is romantically/sexually attracted to othe self-identified women.

G

GAY

A self-identified man who is romantically/sexually attracted to or involved with other self-identified men. 'Gay' can also be used to talk about both men and women or, more generally, the "gay community", but it commonly refers to mer

В

BISEXUAL

A person who is romantically/sexually attracted to or involved with people of the same gender or another gender, "both"/all genders, or is open to such attraction. Note: the word "both" appears in quotation marks to reference the root of bi as meaning two, but also to challenge the binary notion that there are only two genders

TRANS, TRANSGENDER OR TRANS-IDENTIFIED

A term for people whose gender identity, expression, or behaviour is different from those typically associated with their assigned sex at birth. Transgender is a broad term and "Trans" is shorthand for "transgender."

Note: Transgender is correctly used as an adjective, not a noun, thus "transgender people" is appropriate but "transgenders" is often viewed as disrespectful.

Q

QUEER

An umbrella term for a social, intellectual, and/or political movement that seeks to encompass a broad range of sexual identities, behaviours, and expressions. It is also a personal identity that has been "re-claimed" because 'queer' has been historically used as a vicious insult. The letter "Q" added to the end of the acronym LGBT (lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender) can refer to either queer or questioning.

Q

QUESTIONING

The questioning of one's gender, sexual identity, sexual orientation, or all three is a process of exploration by people who may be unsure, still exploring, and concerned about applying a social label to themselves for various reasons.

INTERSEX

A term to describe people who are born with reproductive or sexual anatomy that does not fit typical definitions of male or female. The terms 'intersex' and 'trans' are distinct and should not be used interchangeably.

A

ASEXUAL

Assumily is not the same as celibacy, which is the willful decision to not act on sexual feelings. Assumal people are quite capable of loving, affectionate, romantities to others. In fact there is a lot of diversity in how assumal people experience things like relationships, attraction, and arousal.



PLUS SIGN

A plus sign (+) is added to represent the infinite variety of identities outside of or not represented, by this acronym.

- · Red Life
- · Orange Healing
- · Yellow Sunlight
- Green Nature
- Blue Harmony
- Purple Spirit





Why are visual symbols important?

- This photo is of two community members replacing Pride decorations out of the kindness of their hearts when they noticed the fabric had been vandalized with spray paint.
- Decorations may seem trivial, but they signify to the 2SLGBTQIA+ community that they are welcome and belong here.
- They signify to the rest of Minto that discrimination and homophobia won't be tolerated in our community.

Clearing Misconceptions

- Pride flags do not push sexuality or sex
- Educating children does not endanger them it protects them both physically and mentally
- Sexuality isn't a "choice" and our identities are not "alternative lifestyles"
- Removing Pride flags and maintaining the historical status quo would not be neutral
- Celebrating Pride does not take away from any other amazing initiatives, groups, or identities

Human rights are not negotiable.

June 28, 1970 was the first #pride march for equality and freedom to LOVE!!! When I was 17, I was walking down the street not understanding myelf, and a pick-up truck full of guys my age (who I would also see in class at school) drove by and yelled hateful, derogatory and hurtful comments at me with the sole purpose to make sure I knew I didnt belong.

So many moments happened like that growing up in a small farming community. Being pushed down stairs, my locker at school with a bag of horse manure in it and just plain old name calling are just a few.

I felt that I would never be free to learn, understand and accept myself if I stayed there. A space was created around me where the thought of trying to understand myself was something I didn't even consider.

Yesterday, I was on that same street. While standing in the exact same place where hate was hurled at me, I was with the man I love and I was filled immense #pride and gratitude to see the entire town lit up with all the colours of the rainbow, beautiful art installations and a vibe of inclusivity like never before!

There is a long way to go in this world for equality, acceptance and feeling like you belong, but it is SO comforting to see positive changes happening so that the next generation can live in a community that they are safe and encouraged to be themselves.
