I'm writing as someone who no longer resides in Minto but grew up in Minto and surrounding areas, moving away in my early 20s.

5 years ago I heard that Minto was running it's first ever Pride festival and was so happy and excited for the area. Growing up in Minto I had no experience with or understanding of the queer community. I knew that I was interested in other women, but could not comprehend that a same-sex relationship was even an option. I wasn't in a closet and afraid to come out, I recognized my feelings but didn't think that anything could be done about them so chose to repress them. I did this by doing what I felt was expected in any life course - married a man, had a couple kids, and settled into a life that really didn't fit me or fulfill me.

In my early 30s I was introduced to the queer community by a friend and a whole new world opened up for me. These were people that were living a life I'd always craved but never even imagined was possible.

I am now living my best life as I've learned to embrace all parts of myself and be authentic. I am a drag performer and was honored to be invited to come back to my hometown and perform to raise funds towards future Minto Pride events (later this month). Out of my 6 year drag career THIS is the highlight for me. Being able to go home and feel safe and accepted. Seeing the posts on social media of the streets I grew up in being decorated for Pride has given me such hope for a future where no children will have to deny their identity.

I understand Minto Council has recieved some requests to "stay neutral" in respect to Pride matters. I have shared with you some of my personal journey on why Minto's embracing of Pride is important to me, but let me share my opinion as a social work student...in matters of human rights and social justice, in matters that truly impact the life and death of minority groups, one cannot be "neutral." One either visibibly sides with those most vulnerable or one is complicit in perpetuating harmful systems.

I urge Minto Council to look at the statistics in regards to mental health and suicidality in the queer community (especially youth) and examine what factors reduce those risks. You will see one of the main factors is a supportive environment and you have the means of contributing to that. If you would like more information on specific statistics, there are many locations for such, but I highly encourage you to review reports completed by the Trevor Project, which focus on queer youth.

I'm not sure how much value you will give to my opinion, considering I haven't been able to vote in Minto since before the towns amalgamated, but I do hope that you really consider the positive impact a supportive community can have on minority groups, especially queer youth,

and keep making the right choices for those who are most vulnerable.

Please include my email in the council's briefing information for the decision on public neutrality. I had previously emailed Mayor Turton on the issue in the past year but didn't hear back. I will emphasize the same points I made to him and include a recent email as I feel this is important for <u>all</u> councillors to take into consideration.

<u>This is no longer a request for neutrality</u>. The hatred shared in various town posts, comments and personal posts are very clear to anyone that this "request for neutrality" is a direct attack on the Pride and members of our community. To claim otherwise with the evidence presented on various forums is misinformation – call a Spade a Spade. The day after Pride décor was placed in Clifford Ontario, the town was overwhelmed with calls and emails to remove the décor. In Palmerston, the décor has been removed from some areas as well. We also have local community members demanding that businesses be boycotted for supporting Pride events.

The banners placed in Minto had no concerns for me as a community member – in fact, I was delighted because it means that cost savings for ongoing replacement of décor items that the small vocal minority in our community seem to find time to destroy.

Minto's tagline is "You belong here". If Council chooses to accept a "Public neutrality" decision, hate wins. I'm raising a toddler in our community Councillors, and I look to you for leadership. This is your chance to send a clear message and take an unequivocal stand against hate in our community. Leadership is making difficult decisions; I hope that Council will make the right one.

Previous email communication:

On Friday, September 8, Premier Doug Ford, speaking at an event in Kitchener, made several anti-LGBTQ+ comments including the idea that school boards are "indoctrinating" students on issues of gender. Has there been any form of communication from our Town Council or staff condemning his harmful anti-trans comments? I believe a statement condemning his remarks is an important action to show the LGBTQ+ community in Minto that they are respected and welcome.

In the past, I reached out to our Town Council regarding a statement about the hate crime at UW in neighbouring Kitchener-Waterloo (as many of us commute there for work and education), but no public statement was made.

Minto pride, the diversity committee, and the annual anti-hate event are all important and helpful but we need leadership from you and the other elected officials. We need leaders to send a clear message and take an unequivocal stand against hate.

The recent statements, actions, and demands for removing Pride decorations in our local community both frustrate and disappoint me.

For hundreds of years, all forms of sexuality have been prevalent, both in humans and other living species. Until the last few decades, many of these individuals have been forced to reside in silence, conforming to societal norms, and often living falsehoods for most of their life. The notion that these individuals cannot express their true selves and feel safe in our communities in the 21st century is disheartening. As groups like Minto Pride make strides toward togetherness and community cohesion, we become confronted by those who are misinformed.

Pride month, and the events that come along with it, have been created to celebrate and to bring us together, regardless of who we love. There is no hidden meaning, vindictive agenda, or attempt to cause discomfort for others in our shared spaces. The prejudicial treatment toward these events must end. Although unbeknownst to some, celebrating Pride brings extreme warmth to the hearts of countless people as struggles with sexual orientation and identity are had by many. Oftentimes, these are our neighbors, teachers, friends, family, colleagues, and children. I believe that hate is something we are taught, and not innate, and I have an example of this.

I wasn't your stereotypical boy growing up. Sure, I played with trucks, enjoyed soccer, and ran through backyards with my friends. However, as I grew older, I realized that I may be different than what I saw in society as "normal". After coming out to my parents as gay, I was extremely relieved. I had finally come to the point in my life where I no longer had to pretend or live in fear. I have a 7-year-old brother who understands that I am gay, and doesn't look at me any different. He was always taught to love and accept everyone, regardless of who they love. He doesn't understand why people may look at me differently, or say hateful things.

It is our duty as citizens to ensure that our children and the future of this community are not raised to hate. When you raise children to hate, you take the voice of others. When you raise children to hate, you perpetuate a society where it is okay to treat others as second-class citizens simply because of who they are.

These Pride events do the opposite. They create space, they give voice to those who were too afraid to speak, and they educate our future generations on the importance of kindness and love in our communities. For those who believe that Pride is unnecessary in our community or find it uncomfortable, I would like to leave you with a few facts to paint the harsh reality behind the reasons we make June a celebration of loving everyone.

• Suicide is the second leading cause of death among young people aged 10 to 14, and the third leading cause of death among 15-24 year olds

• LGBTQ+ young people are more than four times as likely to attempt suicide than their peers (Johns et al., 2019; Johns et al., 2020).

• The Trevor Project estimates that more than 1.8 million LGBTQ+ young people (ages 13-24) seriously consider suicide each year in the U.S. — and at least one attempts suicide every 45 seconds.

• The Trevor Project's 2023 U.S. National Survey on the Mental Health of LGBTQ Young People found that 41% of LGBTQ+ young people seriously considered attempting suicide in the past year

So, before you decide to spread hate or create false narratives around why we celebrate, and the reason behind filling our communities with rainbows of support, I ask you to reflect. I invite you to consider how your personal biases reflect on those around you. And finally, I ask you to consider how you make some of those around you feel unsafe when you feel the need to spread hate.

Learn why this is important

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As a resident of Minto I am writing today to let it be known that I am in full support of the Pride celebrations and decorations in Minto. Council should be proud of their efforts to show that our community supports diversity, equity and belonging. Pride is a time to celebrate our common humanity. A time to show solidarity for those who still struggle to live a life free from abuse and discrimination. Our LGBTQIA+ community need our continued support. Our youth need to know we proudly support them in their life journey and that they will always have allies to support and protect their human rights. Visibility is essential in that journey. Please continue to support the effort of Minto Pride to keep asserting our common humanity by breaking the silence and celebrating our true selves.

I am writing this letter **in support** of Minto's visible support of Pride month.

According to the most recent national statistics, over 10% of the LGBTQ+ community lives in rural areas. (Socioeconomic characteristics of the 2SLGBTQ+ population, 2019 to 2021 (statcan.gc.ca)) They are homeowners, business owners, employees, neighbours, and volunteers in our community. They are valued, they are loved, and I refuse to silently stand by while they are being persecuted and discriminated against for pursuing their well established, 21-year-old LEGAL rights. Same sex marriage was legalized in Ontario in 2003, and nationally in 2005.

Minto Pride is about celebrating all types of love and providing a safe space for people to be themselves, with their loved ones. The negative comments towards the visibility of pride in our downtowns is hate fueled. Minto provides several safe spaces for people to worship weekly, that are allowed to advertise, have year-round signage, festive displays. Nobody is starting a petition to remove religious signage. I've never heard of a petition about a nativity scene or Christmas parade.

Finally, it is worth mentioning the obvious benefit of visibly supporting pride- it can and does save lives. Here are some sobering statistics to consider from thetrevorproject.org:

- LGBTQ+ young people are **more than four times as likely** to attempt suicide than their peers (Johns et al., 2019; Johns et al., 2020).
- When LGBTQ+ young people report feeling accepted by an adult, their odds of attempting suicide are significantly lower. In many instances, by more than 40 percent.
- Research suggests that among LGBTQ+ young people, only one-third experience parental acceptance, with an additional one-third experiencing parental rejection, and the final one-third not disclosing their LGBTQ+ identity until they are adults (Katz-Wise et al., 2015).
- Many LGBTQ+ young people lack access to affirming spaces, with only 38% of LGBTQ+ youth reporting that their home is LGBTQ+-affirming and just over half saying that their school is LGBTQ+-affirming. Just over 1 in 3 transgender and nonbinary youth found their home to be gender-affirming, and 52% found their school to be affirming. The Trevor Project's research consistently finds that LGBTQ+ young people report lower rates of attempting suicide when they have access to LGBTQ+-affirming spaces.

I urge Minto council to choose love and acceptance. I urge them to celebrate the people who are creating positive change and building communities. Please do not listen to the voices negative voices of grown adults that are trying to bully our youth.

There was almost a year where my preteen and I couldn't talk, because no matter how supportive I tried to be, it never came across in the right way.

I'm sure I don't have to tell you how well that went over with me.

To remove visible pride decorations in Minto would be to sentence these children to a life of never knowing support, of never knowing who has their back in town. It is moving us backwards in time just as the states are doing right now by limiting abortions and trying to take away contraceptive use. It is saying, why stop there. 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Dear Councilors of the Town of Minto, cc: Minto Pride Committee

I wanted to write a letter of support for the outward public displays of Pride we have seen over the last few years. They are not unnoticed, and they are crucial to our town being a welcoming community for everyone. Minto is known as being fairly conservative, and it is not yet a safe space for everyone to call home and be their most authentic selves- the push back for having neutral pride decor up in the month of June is a prime example of that. We cannot let this intolerance stand in our community as a demonstration of hatred over love.

The work of the Minto Pride Committee has been overwhelming over the past years, and I cannot believe the amount of courage it takes to keep going with this type of work when there can be still so much hostility and homophobia in Minto in 2024. The decor they have chosen for public spaces is tasteful, overall very neutral with banners on lamp posts and signs in public places that are appropriate. Minto's campaign of course is "Where your family belongs" and I want to say that it is important to see outward reflections of this for all families and people here in all spaces.

Minto's Pride committee is showing this not only with their online support, but it is the events that they are holding *in* public spaces which are crucial to ongoing acceptance when people in Minto may not find that yet elsewhere. Assuming the general statistic of 4% of people in Canada being part of the LGBTQ community, in Minto alone this public support is a crucial sign of safety for almost 400 individuals. The events and support that are the direct work of the Pride and DEI committee are welcoming, supportive, connecting, and accessible to families throughout the area who need it. Pride in the Park has happened in Palmerston for some years, and it is not lost on me that while we are celebrating a component of diversity in Minto, that a local business across the street is allowed to freely advertise the sale of Nazi items (relevant of course with the massive slaughter of the queer community during WWII) safe from critique of course because it's a business, not a public property- yet does that business not pay taxes to the Township? There are little things we see every day that tell us if we are safe and welcomed here or not, and it is the month of June when we can gather together and say, despite all that we hear on a day-to-day basis, yes we are welcome here! We can find joy and community and support! When we consider removing access from public spaces, we are sending a message that your family is not meant to be public, it's not meant to be *here*.

It makes me saddened and ashamed to see that there was even a call for this topic to be held at council, though I understand your obligations to hear all members of the community when enough people sign a petition. I would be curious to know of the letters you have received against pride, how many are from people who call Minto their primary residence, and how many spoke up unprompted by others? We have seen over the years that groups of narrow

minded people are targeting small towns to rally to their cause because they believe they will have the most success and impact in spreading their message of hate. The world is watching our response as a rural community and if we will fall prey to demonstrating that we are made up of values that only support the few who already hold many privileges, or if we are a community who can leverage our privileges to support and welcome those who many not share in these experiences and need some extra love and pride! Oxford County was an exceptional example of a community who, when faced with the decision to pursue support, or intolerance, chose to outwardly support their community. Canada watched Oxford, and it will be watching us too.

Homophobia in 2024 it is a tired and out of touch thing to hear from closed minded people. It is dangerous and a legitimate threat to the community. My personal experience with this is that it's typically from those who have the privilege of seeing themselves reflected *everywhere* in Minto as the "default", and they do not question that it's a privilege to see themselves represented "first" or "only". Their expectation may not be to see pride decor up for the month of June, but these same voices seem very keen to see Christmas decor up in parks from November to March with no acknowledgement that this is a public display of a singular group denomination in a community of many- albeit, an elective one! Please don't get this paragraph wrong, I also love the twinkly joy of holiday lights- but there is no reason to enjoy the privilege of seeing your community represented in a public space, while 6 months later deciding that another joyful celebration should not be tolerated there. The queer community is often sensationalized by the virtue that it incorporates sexuality which is often still a taboo topic. When concerns come up around LGBTQ issues, I'm often left to wonder, if this topic was about another community protected by the Human Rights Code of Ontario, would we see the same hesitations? Can you imagine if we had been asked not to hold the march in Harriston responding to anti-Islamic violence that took place here? What if someone created a petition to remove all Black, or People of the Global Majority members from Minto's public advertising? What if we were asked not to show any public support to those who are disabled? The queer community is protected by the HRCO in the same way, and when we remove the component of sexuality it seems absurd, we wouldn't even entertain these ideas! You would be horrified to receive a public letter even suggesting these things! Yet the queer community is about so much more than sexuality! We are individuals and families who still experience oppression and a visible demonstration of support is crucial to our wellbeing.

I love public displays of pride in Minto, and I truly hope to see them continue. When I drive past a building that is flying a pride flag I can see our community reflected in that space. I believe that someone in that building has made a conscious effort to represent our community and show us that we are welcome to use their business, service, or live there just as we are without having to hide. It is visibly clear that in Minto, there are a few voices that are trying hard to encourage a welcoming and friendly environment, and I would ask the Council of Minto what message they are sending with their vote(s) if they consider removing the public display of pride, and if it is aligning with the message that "your family belongs"? I encourage you to vote today for the ongoing support of our community, as well as the efforts of the people who are trying so hard to keep Minto welcoming to all.

Councilors of Minto, does my family belong here? I want to see reflected in your votes that it does.

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Dear Minto Councillors,

I am writing this letter in support of Minto's visible support of Pride month.

According to the most recent national statistics, over 10% of the LGBTQ+ community lives in rural areas.(Socioeconomic characteristics of the 2SLGBTQ+ population, 2019 to 2021 (statcan.gc.ca)) They are homeowners, business owners, employees, neighbors, volunteers in our community and for me they are most importantly my students at Norwell District High School and my relatives. They are valued, they are loved, and I refuse to silently stand by while they are being persecuted and discriminated against for pursuing their well established, 21-year-old LEGAL rights. Same sex marriage was legalized in Ontario in 2003, and nationally in 2005.

Every member of our community regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity, deserves to feel seen, valued, and respected within our community. By celebrating pride and putting up decorations around our community we demonstrate our commitment to creating a culture of human rights and establishing a safe and supportive environment for all. It reinforces that everyone is valued and respected, regardless of their sexual orientation or gender identity in our community. I would hate for people to be discouraged from moving to Minto because they fear that small towns like Minto are full of people who are unwelcoming and homophobic and celebrating pride shows that we are actually far from that rumor. That we are a welcoming and diverse community. My sister in law recently moved to Minto and I can tell you this was definitely her concern .

Supporting and showing my support demonstrates my commitment to creating a culture of human rights and establishing a safe and supportive environment for all my students in this community. It reinforces that everyone is valued and respected, regardless of their sexual orientation or gender identity. I ask you to do the same. Let's commit ourselves to making our schools and our communities places where every student and community member feels accepted, valued, and celebrated for who they are.

Minto Pride is about celebrating all types of love and providing a safe space for people to be themselves, with their loved ones. The negative comments towards the visibility of pride in our downtowns is hate fueled. Minto provides several safe spaces for people to worship weekly, that are allowed to advertise, have year-round signage, festive displays. Nobody is starting a petition to remove religious signage. I've never heard of a petition about a nativity scene or Christmas parade.

Finally, it is worth mentioning the obvious benefit of visibly supporting pride- it can and does save lives. I see the impacts every day that celebrating pride has on the youth in our communities, who desperately want to feel a sense of belonging which is so important for mental health. My students are already struggling with mental health and feeling like they don't have support from their communities makes the problem worse.

Here are some sobering statistics to consider from thetrevorproject.org:

 \cdot LGBTQ+ young people are more than four times as likely to attempt suicide than their peers (Johns et al., 2019; Johns et al., 2020).

• When LGBTQ+ young people report feeling accepted by an adult, their odds of attempting suicide are significantly lower. In many instances, by more than 40 percent.

• Research suggests that among LGBTQ+ young people, only one-third experience parental acceptance, with an additional one-third experiencing parental rejection, and the final one-third not disclosing their LGBTQ+ identity until they are adults (Katz-Wise et al., 2015).

• Many LGBTQ+ young people lack access to affirming spaces, with only 38% of LGBTQ+ youth reporting that their home is LGBTQ+-affirming and just over half saying that their school is LGBTQ+-affirming. Just over 1 in 3 transgender and nonbinary youth found their home to be gender-affirming, and 52% found their school to be affirming. The Trevor Project's research consistently finds that LGBTQ+ young people report lower rates of attempting suicide when they have access to LGBTQ+-affirming spaces.

I urge the Minto council to choose love and acceptance. I urge them to celebrate the people who are creating positive change and building communities. Please do not listen to the negative voices of grown adults that are trying to bully our youth.

Dear Council

I am writing to express my support for the decision of council to hang the Pride Banners in Minto's three urban communities as well as the goal of the newly approved strategic plan to make Minto an inclusive community and "Foster a welcoming, accessible, and understanding community where your family belongs".

I have become very disheartened over the past several weeks to witness the amount of hate and negativity that has been spread throughout the town. Even though it is a very small percentage of people of Minto, their voices have been loud and hurtful, causing a division within the community, while hiding their true goals with a pretense of neutrality (If the banners were in support of any other cause, would there be a petition?), The underhanded way in which at least some signatures were gathered makes me question the validity of the number of people that signed the petition, but even if all signed with full awareness of the intention of it, it is a very small percentage of the voting population within the Town of Minto. There have been calls for a referendum and suggestions that democracy is not being practiced, which is ridiculous. The democratic process in the Town of Minto is working exactly as it should. Elections are held, people vote for their representatives and those with the highest number of votes are chosen to represent the people. If people don't like the decisions being made, they vote accordingly in the next election. Referendums are usually reserved for weighty issues like provinces proposing to separate from the country or, as will be the case this fall for our neighbours in South Bruce, whether the community is willing to host a nuclear waste dump in their municipality - not whether a few banners are raised or not. The claims of "not being informed" are also preposterous – this issue was presented at a public council meeting, discussed, shared online, included in council minutes, reported in the local media and discussed at every community event around, starting last October. If people want to be informed citizens, surely some of the onus is on them to make the minimal effort required to access easily available information.

Being a "neutral" community would result in a colorless and bland municipality to live in. I am proud of the vibrant town in which I live and volunteer in and have worked hard to be inclusive and welcoming to all. I am part of both the Cultural Round Table and the sub committee, for Diversity, Equity and Inclusion and feel the work that is being done, which includes the Pride Committee, is extremely valuable. The CRT supports the cultural organizations and groups within Minto, assisting in promotion, networking, sharing information, participating in events,

implementing public art projects and offering Culture Days activities, to name a few. The DEI Committee is providing education and celebrations of various cultures and dealing with issues of accessibility, food insecurity, homelessness, safety circles, and racism and hate incidents. The budget of a mere \$10,000 per year is miniscule in comparison to the enhanced quality of life and economic impact the town receives from the work of these committees. I've heard a lot about what amount of the "tax payers money" is being spent on this but it is not just the tax payers that are positively affected – it is everyone. If you divide the \$10,000 by the 9000 people that live here, the cost is \$1.11/year per citizen. Is that too much to spend on human decency and kindness?

More directly, the Pride Banners are extremely important as a positive reinforcement to a population of people that have been historically repressed and discriminated against. It is a sign that Minto welcomes everyone here and if you live in a community that proudly raises a flag or banner, you are sending a message that support is found within the community. The Ontario Human Rights Code protects marginalized groups from discrimination and harassment. By hanging the Pride banners and flag, we are demonstrating our commitment to our community that discrimination and harassment of any kind will not be tolerated.

There have been suggestions that the government does not belong in these issues. I absolutely disagree! Governments are elected to take positive and progressive action. If they did not, we would all be living the past where women were not allowed to vote or hold public office, where people of colour were segregated or people with disabilities faced discrimination and lack of accessibility. The local municipal government should foster and support the basic human rights that are protected by the law.

There seems to be a misconception among some that by supporting someone, you are taking from someone else. This is so not true – by sharing the pride banners you are making a statement that everyone is welcome, you are encouraging kindness, acceptance and creating a community I and many others are proud of.

In closing, I offer a statement made by noted mental health professional, Dr. Ron Holt "Gay pride was not born of a need to celebrate being gay, but our right to exist without persecution. So instead of wondering why there isn't a straight pride parade, be thankful you don't need one."

I have been a resident of Minto for more than 10 years. My husband and I moved here to raise our family and were delighted with the friendliness and genuinely nice people that surrounded us. Recent events however, have given me doubts. I read that a community group has submitted a petition with 900 signatures requesting public neutrality. Although this is far from the majority of people in our lovely towns, it still hurts my soul. These people are most certainly only requesting removal of decorations they don't like, including Pride. The same group would likely sign a new petition if you refused to hang Christmas decorations to keep our public spaces "neutral". They will support religion (which is most certainly a choice) over homosexuality and gender dysphoria - which IS NOT A CHOICE.

When residents put forward this sort of nonsense, it echoes to all of our young people, loud and clear, that they will have to keep their secrets and hide who they truly are until they are able to leave home and find a more supportive community. It tells our LGBTQ2+ residents that we are close minded. It makes them feel scared, helpless and hopeless.

According to the Trevor Project, LGBTQ+ young people

are four times as likely to attempt suicide than their peers. At least one attempts suicide every 45 seconds. A lack of social support and affirming spaces is a contributing factor. LGTBQ+ youth living in a community that is accepting of them report much lower rates of attempting suicide. Our rainbows can literally help save them.

A United States Gallup poll in 2022 noted that 7.1% of the population identifies as lesbian, gay, bisexual or transgender. The population of Minto in the 2021 census was 9,094. That would indicate 636 LGTBQ residents in our small town. 636 people that see our rainbow crosswalks and downtown decorations and know that we see them, we support them, and they belong here. We need to be careful who we hate, because it could be someone we love.

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Dear Mayor Turton and Council,

I am submitting this letter for your consideration in response to a petition to draft a bylaw requiring neutrality in flag and crosswalk standards within the Town of Minto.

To be quite transparent, I am not a resident of Town of Minto nor do I have any tax or business interests within the municipality. I am, however a frequent visitor to Palmerston to visit family. I have also had the occasion to attend a recent Minto Pride celebration in support of loved ones, friends and a whole community that continues to experience exclusion, harassment and fear for their safety, despite their sexual and gender identities being protected under federal Human Rights laws. What I experienced at that event was being amongst people expressing their joy and individuality in a multitude of utterly dignified, all-ages appropriate and 100% socially acceptable ways - dancing, laughing, marching, socializing and wearing colourful clothing. This took place under Minto's inclusive, welcoming rainbow flags and event decorations. Even a police officer's rainbow identifier patch caught my eye as that officer proudly walked with participants while performing his duty to protect everyone's safety. I met business owners, teachers and community leaders at the event who were wholly supportive of Minto's 2SLGBTQIA+ inhabitants and who were clearly proud of their community. I've always found Palmerston to be welcoming and a great town to visit and support local businesses.

What I didn't see at the Pride event is probably more notable in light of opinions being shared around Minto community social media pages about this weekend's Pride event. Let me be very clear that there appeared to be no coercive recruiting efforts at Pride in the Park to enlist straight youth into any nefarious 2SLGBTQIA+ 'cult' activities, no nudity on display, no overtly sexual or disturbing behaviours, and thankfully, no aggressive protesting or conflict. Just inclusion. Food. Fun. And face-painting for the kids.

The reason I describe my Minto Pride in the Park experience, and similarly, what prompted me to write you this letter, was a variety of hate-filled social media posts from members of your community aimed at the 2SLGBTQIA+ population. Though social media platforms tend to be the swamp of human communication these days, I have to admit I was still caught off guard when I started reading Minto Pride-related Facebook content. In contrast to the positive and peaceful Pride experience I'd been part of, conversations around the upcoming event and the circulating neutrality petition, spurred me to add my voice to numerous others urging Council to limit the attempt through this petition to stigmatize and exclude members of nonbinary, gay and trans population from your town.

I'm sharing some of the Facebook content that caused my concern. I, of course, have no expectations of Minto Council to police or address individuals' social media posts - these are

being shared to solely highlight the interconnected nature between the neutrality petition and a dangerous intolerance towards an identifiable group protected under Charter rights.

These direct quotes were written by a local Harriston church leader's Facebook page. The pastor urges Minto residents to boycott local businesses that display any sign of support for Pride or the LGBTQ+ community and complains that Minto residents are "being forced for more than one month of the year to have gay pride, flags hanging in our communities where people do not want them BECAUSE OF WHAT IT REPRESENTS."

Within the post, the pastor of **Church encourages** Minto residents to press Council to invoke a similar neutrality clause that a small handful of special interest groups in other municipalities have successfully snuck into local policy to foster hate and exclusion under the guise of 'depoliticizing municipal policy'. The pastor stated 4 days ago on her Facebook page:

- That "the LGBTQ have an agenda that needs to be pushed back"
- That she is concerned about "the disgusting debauchery that takes place publicly in these parades"
- Expressed the belief that "the trans story time is simply a grooming of children"
- Claimed the 'gay lifestyle' "is being forced on our children", again referencing the widely used, yet false trope of "the LGBTQ have an agenda and they want our kids"
- Stated "the entire pride parade is all about sexual preferences and they're trying to push it down our kid's, throats and our community throats"

I'm referencing the pastor's Facebook posts both to highlight that, despite how the petition was presented to Council, the objections to Minto Pride's approved application to fly Pride flags on public infrastructure and host their event with decorations in a public park are grounded in philosophical anti-LGBTQ+ sentiment and aren't, as claimed, simply ensuring neutrality on public infrastructure. In her Facebook thread, the pastor condemns the 'chosen lifestyle' of 2SLGBTQIA+ people, as it conflicts with her specific religious belief system. In her multiple posts condemning the event and its participants, she advises local community members to contact the Town of Minto to specifically oppose Pride-related decorations and support the 'neutrality' bylaw efforts. While the pastor and Minto community members are entitled to whatever belief system they have, it crosses a line when it is weaponized to deliberately suppress others' rights to their own freedom of expression and the Town's responsibility and right to foster an inclusive, safe community for all of their residents.

Comments added to the pastor's page by other local Minto Facebook users were almost more worrisome to me, as they amplified routinely disproven, fear-mongering sound bytes like Pride events only exist as a cover for pedophiles to recruit straight youth, Pride parades are responsible for increased kidnapping rates of young children, and that depraved sexual practices are on display during parades. These harmful and inaccurate tropes and extreme religious-based views (e.g. the AIDS epidemic was punishment from God for practicing the gay 'lifestyle') articulated in the pastor's Minto Pride in the Park thread should not in any way be encouraged by public officials nor should they guide municipal law. This petition for neutral flags, crosswalks and decorations in Minto is simply a thinly veiled attempt to force a segment of your community back into the fear and isolation they have struggled for decades to overcome for the convenience of a relative few who are threatened and irritated by rainbows and the communities they now represent.

Treating this petition as a serious basis on which to create a new bylaw would be an incredibly regressive move by Minto Council and very much out of step with the vast majority of municipalities committed to the safety and inclusion of all of their citizens. However, the Town's reputation isn't the largest thing at risk...the costs of fueling anti-2SlGBTQIA+ sentiment are life threatening for those belonging to that community. Based on US research*:

- Approximately 40% of LGBTQ+ identifying youth contemplate suicide, driven in large part by bullying and harassment about who they are.
- These youth are MORE THAN 4 TIMES as likely to seriously attempt suicide compared to their peers.

Suicide is the second leading cause of death for non-binary, queer and trans children between the ages of 10 and 14*. This alone should be the reason why we provide inclusivity, community and safety opportunities through Pride events, flags and symbols to let them know they're accepted in stores, communities and by public service agencies. As the Canadian community, we're long overdue for a revival of tolerance and kindness.

I urge you to take this as an opportunity to support your vulnerable community members by clearly communicating that you won't contribute to exclusionary tactics against queer/trans residents.

The current state between two sides is at loggerhead. Agreement cannot be achieved due to the fact that neither can expect the other to change **who they are**. Beliefs and values make us who we are. In this case we differ sharply.

Neutrality properly applied means the Governing Body has a policy where they hold no position to either side in publicly funded permanent spaces with regard to an unresolvable sharp disagreement. There is no satisfying either side in this case.

Inclusion need only be stated once or division is created as ALL wasn't meant initially. All inclusive colour symbols are also an addition and divisive as most do not identify with a colour. "ALL are included" is sufficient.

EXAMPLES of Neutrality in the community:

A PARADE FOR OR AGAINST PRIDE DOWN MAIN STREET

Town support would be required to comply with by-laws, traffic safety and the street cut off for all. An anti-pride parade creates similar challenges but both causing further division; neither productive but "poking the bear."

Pride says...we will pay for our own public display:

This implies that ALL of Minto supports the display if done so in the public sphere as a community display; they do not. A prime reason for

a neutral stance by government in the public display.

A Pride or Petition party in a park totally funded by participants

It is the public's park and not a permanent display. Provided town is not funding, it is open space used by anyone.

Drag Story

Given heightened awareness of child abuse, how is an adult dressed as a provocative male/female looking to read stories to young children even entertained? Outright or questionable abuse in public casts a poor light on the community as a whole. Drag is designed for adult comedic entertainment. Hosting a self funded event in the park, while questionable, parents can choose.

Minto is a democracy. A petition of 900 is significant as Mayor Turton stated and is being taken seriously without additional names requested. Any future issues will serve Minto well by having a "neutrality" policy in place.

LGBT+ Take back your power:

Individuals rooting for pride are demanding validation and approval through displays from people who can never provide due to moral convictions. Implied validation by the community as a whole through displays is expecting those who are opposed to change **who they are**; something LGBT+ are asking for... **to be who they are**. Neither can change the other. Inclusion, kindness and respect are fully recognized within this frame without validation or approval. We do not have to agree with everything in order to get along. Many of us have children whom we do not approve or validate some of their decisions or choices, but we respect and support them in their decision without the need for a display of any kind.

It is a win for anyone to be granted and receive inclusion, respect and kindness for living their life as they see fit. When an individual is comfortable with who they are, there is no need to request validation or approval otherwise; especially not from individuals known to sharply differ in regard to lifestyle.

Requesting or demanding to have your lifestyle validated/approved by those who cannot provide it is **giving away personal power**. It is taking on the role of victim; a fruitless and very powerless position. There are numerous groups available to address needs for support.

Reflections/Observations:

#1 Walking about shopping I noticed a couple of adults; both females who appear to be in a relationship. They are holding hands, walking about the store appearing somewhat like a pair of teenagers new to dating. There is obvious discomfort or a sense that they don't feel like they can be themselves as a couple in public.

Is that because of others around them or due to their discomfort being themselves? I observe that there is nobody making fun of, staring at or making a fuss except themselves. Where is their sense of internal empowerment to just be who they are; independent of anyone or anything else.

#2 I'm in IKEA, 2 adult females appear to be in a relationship. They are chatting, walking about and relating just like any other couple. They appear to be just going about their day. I perceive no level of discomfort but just a couple living the life they choose. I have respect for that.

LGBT+ can not be expected to change who they are or what they believe. Nor can others be expected to change who they are or what they believe. A shared understanding of this is vital. People can generally see just fine. They recognize individuals who openly have a differing lifestyle. Lack of education or misunderstanding is not required and to suggest a need for such is naive at best. Everyone is free to show up in the world as they choose. Inclusion doesn't arrive on your doorstep, one needs to step out and join in to be included. Grab a buddy if need be, but let's go out and join in together within our community. bdhollinger

Hello,

I am writing to encourage you to continue to support community based Pride celebrations.

I work full time as a primary healthcare provider in Minto and I wholeheartedly support Minto Pride. Community Pride helps our members feel a glimpse of representation within this very conservative town and this may help foster a sense of belonging. We know that rates of disordered mental health are much higher among queer populations and this is likely related to the ostracization, whether overt, subtle or systemic. Pride offers a moment of space to offset this marginalization. Neutrality supports oppression. And acting to remove queer celebration is a dangerous act fueled by groups that sit in immense power and privilege. Active liberation is the way we move forward toward inclusion.

Anecdotally my very best friend and I grew up in a small, rural, conservative town north of here. There were absolutely no Pride events locally and very little discussion of anything related to queer communities outside of the usual, harmful mockery. When he was 12 years old, and very aware of his sexuality, he was out-ed. He feared the community repercussions so gravely that he attempted suicide. Can you imagine? 12 years old. Getting out a rope, setting it all up. Luckily, his interest in art and music and culture left him ill prepared to choose an appropriate rope for his weight and his set up dropped him. He survived this moment but you can imagine the emotional turmoil and cognitive dissonance he faced living rurally and feeling unwanted and unwelcome. Pride celebrations in our community would have provided a space for his family to let him know that they love everyone. It would have let him see other boys like himself and healthy adults like him too!

Pride gives families and communities opportunities to discuss values and have conversations that folks might otherwise have trouble broaching. I think these small acts of acceptance have the potential to be life saving. I adore these sweet small-town Pride celebrations and I hope that all people and love will continue to be welcome in our little towns.

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Mayor Turton and Council,

In the article that appeared in the Community News following the May 21 Council meeting, Minto Pride Committee officials noted, in part, that the delegation presenters were unable to answer the question regarding whether organizations such as the Lions Club should also not be allowed displays in public spaces. I believe the answer is complex as there are some differences to consider.

When we consider the service groups, horticultural society, sports organizations, the various religious denominations, etc., available in our Town of Minto, it is understood that the banners representing each group/organization are intended to inform residents of the various opportunities available to them to support and participate in, if so desired. The messaging is informative and inviting in nature. It can also be considered neutral in that there is no suggestion of any one group or organization as being more significant or worthy than any other.

When we consider the banners etc. representing the Pride Community, the messaging is very personal in nature. Clearly and understandably, the underlying message is: we are here and we deserve to be recognized, supported and valued. This basic message is equally as applicable for special needs individuals, First Nations peoples, immigrant families, and any other newcomers to the area, etc., for various reasons of a personal nature.

While the Pride Community is concerned with Diversity, Equity and Inclusion, the truth is that we all have our differences in one way or another, and we all have our challenges in this life. No one's life is perfect or easy, for any number of reasons. Putting the focus on any particular group gives the impression of elevating the importance or the worthiness of that group over others, whether or not that is the intention. This impression is reinforced by the length of time afforded to the Pride displays in our downtown spaces. It can begin to feel like an imposition rather than a call for DEI. Respect can't be imposed.

The fact is, we are all people living together in our Town of Minto. We are all diverse in various ways. The only logical solution is for each individual to make a personal commitment to treat others with the respect with which they themselves would wish to be treated, regardless of our differences. This used to be called The Golden Rule. Live and let live, barring violence.

No doubt there are a few who do express hate and discrimination in words and/or actions. Those who react in this way are less likely to be swayed by displays, and are more likely to react negatively. Violent situations call for police involvement, on a case by case basis. Expressing a differing opinion or perspective on an issue does not imply hate or discrimination. Accusing others of being hateful does not achieve anything positive.

I understand your intention behind showing support and inclusivity towards the LGBTQ+ community, however I believe it is also important to consider broader implications and potential consequences of such actions.

My first concern for you to recognize that

you represent and serve a diverse population with a wide range of beliefs, opinions, and values. Displaying the pride flag exclusively alienates or marginalize certain individuals who hold different religious, cultural, or ideological perspectives. As representatives of the Town of Minto I feel you should strive to be neutral and treat all citizens with respect. I am writing in support of the work of the Minto Pride Committee and out of concern regarding the recently proposed "neutrality" by-law.

I admire the work being done by the Pride Committee to make the Town of Minto a welcoming and accepting place. Seeing the rainbow banners adorn the streets has inspired me with hope for the future.

That is obviously not an opinion shared by everyone in the community, nor does it have to be. We do not have to all agree with each other in order to respect each other's right to exist and receive equal treatment from our local government.

Some people are apparently so uncomfortable seeing rainbow banners in public spaces that they're attempting to change the law that would effectively ban all holiday, special occasion, and community group decorations. That is unfortunate. The easy and inexpensive solution to their discomfort would simply be to look away. Rainbow ribbons are not causing any actual harm and they are not "excluding" people any more than Valentine's Day decorations would be excluding single people or Remembrance Day banners are excluding non-veterans.

Other people enjoying something you disapprove of is not oppression. Part of being a functioning adult living in a society is learning to peacefully coexist with people whose values you do not share. It's a fundamental part of being a good neighbour. The importance of being

a good neighbour is something I learned growing up in Minto Township.

There are also more pragmatic concerns to keep in mind. The proposed "neutrality" by-law would be both expensive and ineffectual. Dear Mayor Turton and Councillors

My name is Gayle Blackwell and I am a resident of the Town of Minto and past business owner here. I am writing in response to the petition that recently circulated in our community. I feel a very strong personal connection to this issue as my son who was born and mostly raised in Palmerston. Grew up understanding that this was not a Safe or Inclusive community to be himself in. As a result, only came out as gay once he moved to the city about 12 years ago.

I question the ethics behind the petition and the false information given to obtain signatures. The petition was developed by individuals who are openly against the 2SLGBTQIA+ Community foremost Drag Queens and Drag Storytime. They are using children and pedophiles as their main platform to turn others against our 2SLGBTQIA+ community. What need is there for this bylaw if not to suppress one very specific community because of their constitutionally protected sexual orientations and gender identities.

A recent post on social media using the Pride in the Park Poster by a local Pastor states "*I say no* one should be attending this event as it's based on sexual preference. The Town of Minto wants your input so email them which I am going to do. Better still boycott businesses who support this type of thing for the whole month of June it's your right to do so". It is especially urgent to protect members of our 2SLGBTQIA+ Community when people in a community leadership position are using both their religious and social platforms to spread false information and hate. This is a form of hatred, and the total opposite of what Pride stands for which is Inclusion, Safety and Acceptance.

When speaking of the petition at a local coffee shop a close family member of one of the delegates that signed the petition. Was heard stating, *"they should take all those people to the back 40 and shoot them".* I would question if the petition is about neutrality and inclusivity in public spaces or an attempt to take our 2SLGBTQIA+ Community to the back 40? One delegate stated that *"the petition has nothing to do with hate and that they had people that wanted to sign it, but we wouldn't let them."* I would question that.

I have watched the 3 council meetings many times regarding the petition and the requested bylaw. Words and phrases that stick out to me and have been used repeatedly by the delegates and supporters are as follows: "those people, specific group, alternative lifestyle, sexual messages, not worthy of recognition. Controversial, neutrality, contentious issue, different beliefs and values, democracy. The people participating in this lifestyle, this acronym of people, the group that we are speaking about, group seeking attention". How can anybody say that this petition is about neutrality and inclusivity in public spaces within our community?

The phrases used in the petition clearly articulate intolerance towards Minto citizens that have as much right to exist and put on a celebration event as any other group or resident in the community. A small collection of anti-2SLGBTQIA+ Individuals voicing disapproval based on their own personal beliefs about how others conduct their private lives should not guide municipal laws.

Another statement that was made by a delegate at a meeting was. *"It's not done out of hate or discrimination in one sentence*. Again, a direct attack towards our 2SLGBTQIA+ Community. Petition organizers are seeking to erase any visual reminder or inclusionary symbols of humans they choose in vilifying. When it comes to the banners it's all or nothing nobody should be able to pick and choose. The delegate also stated when asked about putting up Lion's banners in recognition of prominent members of the club. "Lions are achieving good quality and benefiting the whole community. So, I think they are worthy of acknowledgement. When talking about this acronym of people who choose to live an alternative lifestyle whether we agree or not is not worthy of recognition." Another direct attack on our 2SLGBTQIA+ community.

Supporters of the petition even tried to stop the Pride Flag from being raised on May 31 at the Town of Minto office. Stating "A flag being talked about is being raised May 31. I strongly suggest not to put it up with what's been going on". Another direct attack on our 2SLGBTQIA+ Community.

I feel that if this petition is accepted by council and changes are made. We are headed backwards as a community and setting our 2SLGBTQIA+ youth up for greater risk. Pride month is dedicated to education, celebration and commemoration of LGBTQ+. It began after the Stonewall Riots in Manhattan which was a series of gay liberation protests that started late June 1969 (hence June being Pride Month). That was the tipping point for LGBTQ rights and the gay rights movement. Signage, banners, flags and crosswalks along with Pride Celebrations symbolizes to those in and passing through our community that you are Included, Accepted and most importantly Safe here.

I would ask Council to please choose Love over Hate!!! And to allow celebrations of Inclusion, Safety and Acceptance to continue within our community by vocally opposing this petition.

The level of acrimony and division over this issue has spilled over on all sides, making it an 'us against them' issue. While this may not be intentional on your part, it is certainly attributed to your decisions regarding the pride flags and crosswalk symbols currently displayed. My appeal to you is to follow the instincts of those who would advocate for neutrality so that this ceases to be such a divisive issue in our community. To the Honourable Mayor and Members of Council,

I am writing to Town of Minto council members on the petition proposing the removal of pride flags from municipal properties in favour of 'neutrality'. My partner Jake Rice and I want to offer our full support to the Minto Pride Committee in their efforts to preserve the presence of the Pride flag.

We are annual visitors to the area for the Mount Forest Fireworks festival. It's one of our favourite festivals to attend each year and something for the whole region to take pride in as a top 100 festival in Ontario!

You may recognize us from the festival if you imagine us at 10 feet tall, delighting crowds and dancing on our stilts. We believe that visiting the area each year and being part of the festival has in some way contributed to it becoming both a large tourism draw and a beloved community event for Mount Forest and the surrounding communities.

If you'll allow me, I'd like to share a brief story about the importance of visibility.

Early in my career, as I was growing my business, I had the opportunity to hire more performers, including female identifying Stilt performers. While performing alongside a female performer, I heard a young girl say to her mother "I didn't know girls could walk on stilts too!" This young attendee's first time seeing a female performer on stilts opened her eyes to the possibility that she too could "walk tall".

I was born and raised in a rural Ontario community much like Minto. It was a small farm community. Growing up, I always knew who I was. However, I didn't see anyone around me who was Gay or imagined it could be a possibility. That caused me to carry a great deal of shame and fear.

Jake and I are not just performing partners, we are partners in real life too. I was the first OUT 2SLGBTIQIA+ performer on North America's busker festival circuit. And, each year, we look forward to being part of community celebrations like the Fireworks festival.

When we travel to a new town and see a Pride flag, it's more than a symbol acknowledging Pride month. For us, it's a safety beacon letting us know we do not need to hide who we are to protect our safety. We know we're welcome and don't have to fear.

When we see the Pride flag in our home community, we see it as an acknowledgement of the history of harm done to 2SLGBTQIA+ persons. Whether it was the criminalization of both our identities and relationships until the 1960's, or the history of violence as people were dragged into the streets and beaten by police only steps from where we live now in Toronto as recently as the 1980's; a time many of us were alive for. It has only been since 2005 that we would have the ability to get married in Canada. Acknowledging Pride month and raising the progress Pride flag is a public commitment to repairing that harm and a commitment to pursue to equity and safety these people deserve in their daily lives.

Make no mistake, we know our community members are still under attack. We know that an attempt to remove these symbols is not an attempt for "neutrality"; it is an attempt at erasure. It seeks to remove visibility from the community and suppress our community members back into hiding. It is simply an act of violence.

Symbols have power. I strongly caution Council that while the presence of a symbol speaks loudly, its removal speaks much louder. A faith leader knows that any campaign to remove another place of worship from their community for having different beliefs is an attack on their own religious freedoms and ability to gather. The removal of any symbol which represents an equity-deserving group in your community undermines everyone's freedoms.

My partner and I are grateful to be visit and be part of celebrating your beautiful region and the warm, welcoming community every year! We strongly believe that the considered, collective voice of Minto will affirm standing with the 2SLGBTQIA+ community.

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To whom it may concern, the Pride celebration and representation in small communities like our own can truly mean life or death for some individuals. Having grown up within the Palmerston and Harriston area and being a resident, I have experienced this firsthand. I urge the community to continue to nourish that safe, accepting, and inclusive environment that is desperately required for all LGBTQ+ members of the community.

I was raised in the church at the second second church from the age of 11 to 18. It deeply anguishes my heart to see that homophobic behaviour is still taking place there. Which appears to be occurring more outwardly now than ever. **Second Second** consistently appears to be a problem within the community with their judgment, homophobia, and cult-like behaviour. As a youth who attended **Second**, I feel that I was groomed, manipulated, controlled and shamed from the minute I walked into the door. Numerous inappropriate sexual advances happened towards me from boys and men in the church. I feel as though both of the senior pastors along with many church members failed to protect me as they preferred to blame the victim in every circumstance rather than hold the predators accountable. A place that was supposed to feel safe and accepting only ever made me feel like I was a problem that needed to be "fixed" through shame and prayer.

Unfortunately, I am not the only one this has happened to. I am among countless others who have not yet shared their story. I left during my time in the internship program because I was not allowed to voice my own opinion, and was not as safe nor as accepted as I once thought I was. At 19 I became pregnant with my son and was "silently shunned" from the church. Years after separating from the church I finally felt safe enough to come out to all of my family and friends. I remember living my life every day in fear at church and wearing a mask pretending to be someone who I wasn't. The Pride Celebrations, various decorations, flags, etc. make individuals like myself feel safe, represented, and accepted within the community. This is a safety resource for many individuals that needs to be kept.

I feel it is unjust for **Church** or ANY of its members to have jurisdiction over the lives of others when they are an outwardly misogynistic, homophobic, and unsafe church. Protesting an event that loves individuals for who they are is hypocritical. I urge every individual from protesting to delve a little deeper into Scripture as their ignorance appears to stem from a lack of knowledge of God's word and His teachings. The Lord who I believe in loves all unconditionally and teaches us to not judge. Therefore to be accepting of EVERYONE, without restraints, conditions, or plans of "converting or healing", including those within the LGBTQ+ community. We are to love and accept all people not just those who fit the cookie-cutter Christian mould and submit their tithes and offerings every Sunday morning at church. (1 John 4:7, Hebrews 12:14, Mathew 7:1-3)

Dear Mayor, Deputy Mayor, and Councillors,

We are writing you this letter of support today for those within our community that identify as within the 2SLGBTQI+ community. With the recent happenings, negative comments, and vandalism occurring regarding the events, décor, and celebrations associated with Pride month, it only felt right as allies of the 2SLGBTQI+ community to address these happenings. It is disheartening to know that individuals within our community feel the need to segregate, judge, penalize, and harm those within a minority group. Growing up in small communities such as Palmerston, Harriston, Clifford, and/or surrounding areas, they do come with their positives but, negatives as well. As adolescents begin to fall into their pre-teen and teenage years, it is known that what individuals say or do will get around quickly. This was sometimes a lesson that was learnt through harsh manner but, came with the smalltown environment where everyone knows everything and everyone. Although this creates the amazing smalltown charm many are drawn to, for others, it creates anxiety, and fear. Knowing you do not fit into the niche or societal norms, especially within an intimate environment such as our small towns, can cause many to feel displaced, scared, and alone. The last thing most people want in our towns is to be centered out or the talk of the town for all to know their business and personal life. It is for this reason along with the possibilities of stigma, shame, unacceptance, and fear of the unknown that those that identify as 2SLGBTQI+ tend to remain silent. With this silence comes a more than four times increased risk of attempting suicide, higher rates of depression, suicidal ideation, and suicidality, and a higher rate of bullying being experienced. These individuals are also at higher likelihood of experiencing violent crime victimization, hate crimes, and inappropriate behaviours while in public settings. With the type of statistical information mentioned above, along with many other worrisome statistics available, it is a wonder as to why individuals within our towns feel the need to further add to these statistics through ignorance, misunderstanding, and overreaction.

As allies of the 2SLGBTQI+ community, it is one of our responsibilities to demonstrate our support and to utilize advocacy. As a family and individuals, we have always been involved in team-based sports where, although individuality mattered, the sense of team and unity always prevailed. This mattered because although at the end of the day, we are individuals within our communities, however, we continue to work towards providing an overall environment and county where all are accepted and welcomed. As a family, we were taught and have always practiced the idea of treating those around you the way you want to be treated and that if something was not directly hurting you or affecting your life, then continue to live your own life. This is an instance where the individuals who feel "attacked" or that "neutral ground" is required, need to learn and practice the above-mentioned characteristics. Where they need to realize, those choosing to celebrate their successes, strive for equality, and desired fairness regarding sexual preference deserve those items. The words being utilized have deeper meaning and to

understand those meanings is ensuring they are being utilized in their correct and intended manner. The word "attacked" is defined as a verb that includes explanations outlining the words forceful, assail, bitter worded, act on injuriously, etc. All the terms related to the word "attacked" are not associated with the events, décor, and celebrations that are occurring around town. Nothing is being forced upon these unsupportive and close-minded individuals, unfriendly words have not been utilized, and nothing has been acted out through injurious means. When it comes to the term "neutral ground", this was originally a term developed and utilized in situations of war involving land. Considering events, décor, and celebrations are not items relevant or involving acts of war, using words such as "neutral grounds or areas", would really be considered over the top and extreme. There is much dire problems and situations to be concerned about happening locally, provincially, federally, and internationally. To utilize such language towards a celebration of advancement towards further equality is really a slap in the face to those currently experiencing true acts of war such as third-world countries and those in territorial wars now.

In the simplest of terms, if one does not want to participate within these events, these individuals should feel free to skip them and not attend. The event runs regardless of whether an individual chooses to independently support it or not, therefore, they should find something else to participate within if so desired. If one does not enjoy a rainbow painted sideway due to what it could potentially represent in their own individual perspective, then do not utilize the crosswalk. Live in this small town long enough and you will realize that crosswalks do not always tend to be utilized for their purposes. If a park bench is painted in the 2SLGBTQI+ colours as a means of support, then do not sit on said bench if you are uncomfortable. Rather, bring your own chair to sit in, or utilize one of the other 15+ benches located around our beautiful community. The items being mentioned are those that have been given power and societal meaning by the individuals viewing them and taking them into perspective as negative connotations. If someone is offended by a rainbow-coloured bench as they realize it is regarding 2SLGBTQ+ support, they could, instead, choose to educate their child on that it is simply a fun-coloured bench that represents the rainbow. Individuals are giving the meaning behind these items the power as they are choosing to put their efforts and energy into having issue with the intended meaning and thought of these items. If one were to not tell their child what the colours stand for, the child or children would not be aware of the meaning as they are required to gain this knowledge. If the mayor, deputy mayor, and councillors gave into such demands, they would be seen as furthering the element of power towards those who are attempting to influence or impact the lives of others within society. One's sexual orientation, gender expression, and/or gender identity and the way in which individual desire to express those, have nothing to do with others. This is simply another quest for those who believe they have more power in society to continue to exercise that power over others who can be seen as vulnerable or weak, specifically those within this minority groups. It is through and because of this type and instance of power demonstration that minorities continue to face prejudices, stigmatization, and remain trapped through marginalization. By providing the opportunity for the 2SLGBTOI+ community to be celebrated and supported, you are continuing to demonstrate that all are welcome and celebrated within our local community. This continues to assist in acceptance, confidence, support, and overall happiness as feeling welcome and support is all anyone truly ever desires and wants.

We ask that you continue to allow the 2SLGBTQI+ community to celebrate their community, continue to demonstrate support through décor and events, and just, at the end of the day, to demonstrate empathy and compassion towards those within their minority community. As individuals who have personal connections to friends, family members, colleagues, players, etc. that identify with this community, acceptance and destigmatization are needed. Being able to truly embody who one is meant to

be and desires to become is all anyone can ever ask for at the end of the day. The 2SLGBTQI+ community has gone through numerous hardships in the last few decades after experiencing Stonewall, conversion therapy camps, inability to be seen as equal as it relates to benefits, marriages, unions, life insurance, etc. stigmatization through misunderstanding and lack of knowledge, lack of acceptance, and even the most recently development of seven countries including Canada JUST banning conversion therapy in December of 2023. We ask that individuals continue to be accepted and celebrated within our community and feel the support they need as small communities are already, as previously stated, both a blessing and a curse depending on individualized experience.
